President's Report. In addition to her attached written report (Attachment A), President Stout:

- Updated the Board on Jeff Ladrach on her health condition.
- As a result of our move in Adams County, informed the Board of calls she has received from interested individuals about possible sites.
- Reported that Mr. Buck has been appointed on the Governor's Task Force on Campus Security and is now in charge of safety on the campus.
- Thanked Trustee Griffiths for attending the OBOR Trustees' Conference and the All Ohio Academic Team Recognition Program.
- Announced OACC has hired a consultant, Neal Clark, to represent the organization to the Senate.
- Asked the Board their preference on the June Board Meeting. After a discussion, the Board decided to meet before graduation on June 15 at 4 p.m., dinner with the graduation speaker at 5:30 and graduation at 7 p.m.
- After consultation with the Board, selected June 18 for a social event with the trustees, faculty and staff at Ralph Shell's house.
- Reported dates for the PN and RN Pinning Ceremonies.
- Distributed to the Board a list of the President's Activities for April and May.
- Referenced the AOC section in her written report and added that Corporate and Community Services is the service provider for the Youth Build program.

Report from the Vice President of Business and Finance. In response to questions, Mr. Buck gave an explanation for Scholarship Expenditures on Exhibit 1 and for Corporate and Community Services Discounts, License and Certificates and Equipment Greater Than \$50 on Exhibit 4 of the Financial Report (Attachment B). Lastly, the College's policy for returning books was discussed.

County Rotation of Trustees

The Board decided not to change the current system of county rotation of trustees. The following points were brought up.

- In May of 2008, terms end for Mr. McFarland, Mr. Herdman and Mr. Mongold
- With the current system, Adams County should have two representatives, Brown County should have one, Clinton County should have two, Fayette and Highland should have two each.
- In 2010, terms end for Ms. Griffiths, Mr. Ward and Mr. Shell. Fayette County will have two new representatives at the same time and the original intent was to have one senior trustee and then that member could help the new member.
- In 2010, Highland County would go to Brown County in the event there are no resignations.
- For various reasons, resignations occur and the system of rotating alphabetically will not work. John Schlichter, Doug Lynn, and others left in the middle of their terms and so the Board rotated alphabetically by county from Adams to Brown, etc. It sounds good in theory but it does not work.
- At the formation of Southern State Community College and for several years Adams County had only one trustee while the other four counties had two. Nothing was found as to why Adams County had only one. The Board then decided to rotate alphabetically, which worked until too many people resigned.
- In less than 12 months three terms will end. If we do absolutely nothing Adams County will appoint one and Clinton County will appoint two.
- It will always be set in motion that the county with one board member would get the next appointment. Maybe between now and next May we might have vacancies on the board and that would go to Clinton County. Two will be coming on from Clinton at the same time and in two years two from Washington Court House.
- Even if the system is fixed with Clinton and Fayette, if someone resigns for some unforeseen reason such as health, death, etc, the system is out of whack.
- Because of the law, a ten-member board is not an option.

Finance Committee Report

The Finance Committee met prior to the meeting. Due to uncertainties with the state budget at this time, the budget for FY 2008, Item VI.B, and Non Teaching Staff Percentage Increase, Item VI.B, will be presented at the June 2007 meeting. The Higher Education Compact, Item VI.A is no longer under consideration throughout the state.

Presentation

Dr. Ryan McCall gave an update about the South Campus. He invited the Board to tour the campus after the Meeting and spoke about:

- the newly installed digital signing, which was purchased with UD money,
- the kitchen remodeling project, which is scheduled for completion by May 25,
- the area artists exhibit currently on display and
- the number of individuals who visited the campus last month with various groups totaled approximately 230.

Board County Updates

Members of the Board of Trustees gave updates on the activities of their counties. President Stout expressed appreciation for the updates and said they add a new dimension to our meetings and said we can determine if we want to give updates at every meeting or once per quarter. The audience agreed that it was helpful to hear the county updates.

SSCC Graduation

Graduation will be held on June 15 at 7 p.m. in the Patriot Center. Jared Isaac will be the graduation speaker. Jared received an associate of science degree from Southern State Community College in 2003. He was a PSEO student and graduated from East Clinton High School that year also. Jared received a bachelor of science degree in Biochemistry from Lee University in Tennessee. Currently, Jared is working on a master's degree and this fall will begin a Ph.D. program in Biomedical Research at the University of Cincinnati School of Medicine. As we have done in the past, we will have dinner with the speaker prior to graduation. More details will follow.

Vice President of Academic Affairs

Dr. Ryan McCall has been selected as the new Vice President of Academic Affairs. Prior to his appointment, Ryan served as the Dean of Student Services/South Campus Director. You will recall that Ryan worked at Shawnee University before coming to SSCC. His experience with the university system will be instrumental as we seek to strengthen our transfer alliances. As South Campus Director, Ryan has been working with faculty and on academic issues. One major task is the Transfer Assurance Guidelines (TAGs) submission process. Since the beginning of March, 51 classes have been submitted to the Ohio Board of Regents for approval in the TAGs.

GEAR Up Grant

The Board of Regents awarded the College \$12,000 to be used for campus visits, student mentoring, PSEO advising, and other activities that further the aspiration of students to attend college. The funds are part of the state match for the federal GEAR Up grant.

Respiratory Care Program

The first class for Respiratory Care began in April of 2006 with 15 students. Throughout the past year, we have received an additional 74 applicants. The program begins with a new group of qualified students every spring. A new class with 16 students started this spring. The first class will be completing their final classes this fall.

Miami Trace Program

Rep. John Schlichter has earmarked \$75,000 to continue the Miami Trace PSEO program for the third year. This is a \$15,000 increase over the previous awards. Currently, we have 18 students taking English and speech Spring Quarter. The grant is used to cover tuition, books, administrative costs, and supplies.

Shawnee University

I spoke with Dr. Rita Morris, president of Shawnee University about investigating ways that our institutions can collaborate. As a result, Jim Buck met with Steve Donohoo, Shawnee's vice president for Finance and Administration, to share ideas. Dr. Morris and I are in the process of scheduling a meeting to further the discussion.

Corporate and Community Services

The Adams County Chamber of Commerce recognized Southern State Community College's Corporate and Community Services at their annual awards dinner that was held on April 19 with the Community Service Award. Russ Brewer, Enterprise Center Coordinator, also received the Chamber Service Award. A picture that was taken at the event is included in the attached report from the Center for Business and Industry for April, which includes the Dean's Report as well (attachment pages 1-2).

Also attached is an invitation to an Open House for the Enterprise Center in Winchester. The Open House will be held on May 9 from 3 p.m. until 6 p.m. with a ribbon cutting ceremony scheduled at 3:15 (attachment page 3).

The Center for Business and Industry provided a grant to the Highland County Chamber of Commerce for technology training. Julia Basham, who teaches full time at SSCC's in Computer Science, provided the training. Attached is a thank you letter we received from the Chamber (attachment page 4).

Governor's Task Force on Campus Security

Jim Buck has been appointed to the Governor's Task Force on Campus Security. The work of the Task Force will evolve according to need but discussions will begin with the following topics:

- 1. Managing responses to violent events, including how to ensure a robust internal communications infrastructure together with effective liaison to state and local law enforcement.
- 2. The role of campus administrators, including public safety officers, in responding to reports of implied or implicit as well as explicit threats of violence.

Peace Officers Training Program Recognition

Sixteen students graduated from the Peace Officers Training Program on April 26. We hope many of the students will consider the Associate Degree program in Law Enforcement.

Faculty Spotlight

Jon Davidson, Bob Headley, and Bob's wife, Susan, are singing in the chorus for the Springfield Symphony at their May 5th concert. They are singing in Beethoven's Ninth Symphony and are singing the in the original German.

Don Storer has been speaking with an archaeologist at Mount Vernon and will have access to soil samples from George Washington's garden. This is part of ongoing work in which soil analysis supplements the archaeological excavations and provides additional support for their conclusions. It also ties in to the work Don is doing with the University of South Florida and could be a research module for the REEL Project at The Ohio State University.

Area Artists Exhibit

Area artisans' work will be exhibited in the Appalachian Gateway Center from April 25 through May 25 from 12 noon until 4 p.m. daily. The Board will have an opportunity to view the exhibit at the Board Meeting.

Junior High and High School Students Visit Campuses

On April 23, 125 eighth grade students from East Clinton High School visited the North Campus, and on April 26 and 27 eighth grade students from Hillsboro High School visited Central Campus with 110 students each day. On April 13, seven juniors and seniors from the Alternative School and their mentors from NCB Bank visited the Central Campus. Each group received information about SSCC, various career and financial aid information and campus tours. Lisa Copas, Enrollment Coordinator, planned the visits.

Adult Opportunity Center

SSCC's ABLE program received a Superior Rating based on the FY 2006 data from the Ohio Department of Education. Congratulations to Karyn Evans and her staff for their excellent work.

I wanted to share the attached article (attachment page 5) from the *Record Herald* with the Board about one of our Adult Opportunity Center students at Fayette Campus, Chad Scott, who is enrolled in the YouthBuild Program. The program is funded by a federal grant that combines GED preparation and building skills training. The AOC has been involved in this collaborative effort with the Fayette County Community Action for three nine-month terms.

Enrollment Update

Enrollment for this Spring Quarter in headcount is up 1.6% over Spring Quarter 2006, and FTE is up 4.8% over last Spring Quarter. Overall, for the year, we had a 4.3% increase in FTE over last year.

ACCT 2007 Governance Institute





Dean's Report

Adams County-Our newly named "Enterprise Center" is up and running in Winchester. Located at the Tri-County Business Development Center at 2035 Tri-County Road, Coordinator Russ Brewer has completed the move and is offering training and small business consultative services. An Open House is planned for May 9 from 3 pm until 6 pm. We are pleased to report \$7,960 has been provided to the Enterprise Center by Adams County/Ohio Valley School District to provide an entrepreneurial training program in the county schools.


Fayette County conducted an audit visit in April to review our contracts for One-Stop and Child Care provider training programs, and we are pleased that Fayette County found us in compliance with the contracts. They expressed pride in the partnership with Southern State Community College, and expressed in writing the desire that it continue. Since July of 2004, Fayette County Job and Family Services and its partner agencies have spent \$403,000 for credit and non-credit training with Southern State.

Continuing attention is being paid to the Truck Driving Academy in efforts to control the effects of high fuel prices on the bottom line. Control measures introduced to offset increased costs include teaching shifting techniques to improve mileage and reducing extra training provided to participants.

Center for Business and Industry- April 2007

Workforce Services Unlimited- CBI completed 72 hours of computer training for dislocated workers which was begun in February and held at the North Campus Computer Lab. Training consisted of Introduction to email and the Internet, Introduction to Personal Computers 1 & 2, Keyboarding, Microsoft Word 1 & 2, and Microsoft Excel 1 & 2.

Corporate and Community Services was presented with the Community Service Award at the Adams County Chamber of Commerce Dinner held at the home of Daniel and Mary Miller, and Russ Brewer was selected for the Chamber Service Award. Representing the College and pictured below along with Roger Cruser are: Sherry MacDowell, Jeff Foster, Ryan McCall, Sherry Stout, Russ Brewer, and Bob Brown.



EnterpriseOhio Spring Advantage Forum- The EON hosted a round table forum at Shawnee State University on April 20, 2007. Bob Brown attended with 21 other campus representatives from across the state. Topics discussed were:

- Performance measures developed by the Network to ensure high performance and growth
- Career Advancement Accounts- Pilot sponsored the State Workforce Development Agency to enable dislocated workers to receive a short term credential or certificate to return to work quickly and the opportunity of Community Colleges to respond to the need
- FY 2008-9 Budget- Discussion led by Michael Taggart of the Ohio Board of Regents on thoughts of consolidating training dollars (Targeted Industry, OITP, etc) to fund a New Worker Guarantee program and the upside and pitfalls of the initiative and its effect on non-credit training. Design is intended to attract new business to Ohio by guaranteeing a skilled, well-trained workforce.

Please review the accompanying Financial Reports. We have received some general information on the House of Representatives budget proposal for FY 08 and FY 09. There are clear differences between this proposal and that of the Governor, however, the method of implementation of any budget at the Ohio Board of Regents level could significantly impact individual institutions. The period during the state budget process has always been a time of uncertainty where patience was important. The added tuition constraints that have been introduced make this even more necessary. Information will be shared as it is received.

Our first meeting with Steed Hammond Paul is scheduled for Friday, May 11, 2007, 2:00 p.m., at the Fayette Campus. We plan to have a committee with six to seven members with representatives from faculty, staff, and administration. This project provides the College an excellent opportunity to improve our services to our students. We look forward to getting started.
